# Dental Hygiene Program Information Packet

#### Introduction

The Dental Hygiene Program provides basic education and entry-level experience, to prepare graduates for licensure as dental hygienists. Approximately 36 students are accepted and begin each fall semester for a two-year program. Dental hygiene didactic and clinical courses are conducted at the Higher Education Center at National City. Classes are held five (5) days per week. The program is full time (see page 7 for semester unit load).

## **General Career Description**

A dental hygienist is a licensed, preventive oral health professional providing education, clinical, and therapeutic services to the public in a variety of settings. As the preventive specialist of the dental healthcare team, the dental hygienist promotes and maintains oral wellness through services such as oral health assessments, education, removal of soft and hard deposits from teeth, and use of adjunct services such as sealants, fluorides, and chemotherapeutic agents.

As a healthcare professional, the dental hygienist is responsible for protecting and maintaining the confidentiality of information pertaining to the health status of individuals.

# **Career Options**

Dental hygienists can provide preventive and therapeutic services in a dental office or clinic setting. They may also work in public health settings, schools, skilled nursing facilities and mobile clinics. Clinical practice requires a minimum of an associate degree education.

The dental hygienist may also serve as an administrator/manager for community or state dental health programs; may provide sales and education for dental product companies; may be an educator in a dental hygiene or dental school program; or a researcher in a university or corporate setting. Many of these roles require a baccalaureate or graduate level degree.

## **Admissions & Application Process**

The dental hygiene education curriculum is a post-secondary scientifically oriented program, which is rigorous and intensive. Because enrollment is limited by facility capacity, special program admission criteria and procedures are necessary. Applicants for the Dental Hygiene program must be proficient in several subject areas. Prerequisites include courses in Life Sciences, Oral and Written Communication, Psychology, Sociology, Nutrition and Math. All the required prerequisites are mandated by the Dental Hygiene Board of California (DHBC) and the Commission of Dental Accreditation (CODA).

# Southwestern College Dental Hygiene (DH) Program Prerequisites

All DH prerequisites must be completed by the time of application (January). All the required prerequisites and admission requirements are mandated by the Dental Hygiene Board of California (DHBC) and the Commission on Dental Accreditation (CODA).

It is the policy of our accrediting institutions to require all prerequisite course work be completed and recency requirements met prior to applying for program admission. No "In Progress" coursework can be accepted.

#### For each of the 5 science courses

- Must be at least 4 semester units with an <u>inclass lab</u> component (quarter and semester units are not equivalent; 6 quarter units = 4 semester units)
- Must be taken for a letter grade, "C" or better. Pass/No Pass and Credit/No Credit grades are not accepted.
- Exam scores of any kind will not be accepted for substitution.
- Must meet a **seven**-year recency requirement at the time of application to the program
- Together they must have a cumulative minimum GPA of 2.7

Southwestern College limits the number of times a student can repeat courses for credit and/or to improve GPA

### Additional Details on Satisfying Prerequisites

- 1. Students must demonstrate requisite **math proficiency** by means of one of the following:
  - a) earn a "C" or better in Math 60 or Math 72 or more advanced course with equivalent content, no support courses.
  - b) a transcript indicating an earned associate or higher degree from a regionally accredited U.S. college/university <u>and</u> completion of a Math course with equivalent or more advanced content, indicating a grade of "C" or better.

### For DH Prerequisites taken at another college/university:

The Dental Hygiene Program only does an informal evaluation of your transcript if/when you apply to the program and cannot make any pre-determination via email or phone.

DH prerequisites taken at another college/university NOT LISTED on the DH prerequisite equivalency grid (page 8 of this packet), can be reviewed in advance to confirm that the course will be accepted by the DH program. Courses listed on the grid <u>do not require a petition</u>, as they have already been determined as equivalent.

Submit a Petition for Major Substitution for each course along with supporting documentation (course descriptions from the catalog year in which the course was taken, or course syllabus <u>and copy of transcript</u>). A Petition for Major Substitution will only be reviewed <u>after</u> the course has been completed, not before.

Petitions should be submitted by the summer prior to applying (or sooner) in case a course is not approved, allowing the student to take a course during the fall semester.

### **General Education and Graduation Requirements**

Please note that general education and Southwestern College graduation and proficiency requirements need to be met before completion of the dental hygiene program. It is <u>strongly recommended</u> that you complete these requirements along with the prerequisites for the Dental Hygiene Program prior to entering the program. Students must consult with a counselor to assist in developing a Student Educational Plan (SEP) to ensure requirements are met on schedule.

IT IS HIGHLY RECOMMENDED TO MEET WITH A COUNSELOR TO REVIEW ALL PREREQUISITES AND TO COMPLETE A STUDENT EDUCATION PLAN (SEP), PREFERABLY BY THE EARLY SUMMER, PRIOR TO APPLYING.

#### **Admissions Process**

A separate application is required for this program and is available online during the application filing period. It is important to review the Dental Hygiene Program website for detailed information about <u>filing</u> <u>period dates and the application process</u>.

The dental hygiene program accepts 36 students who begin the program in the fall (August). To be considered a qualified candidate the applicant must:

- 1) Complete all dental hygiene prerequisite coursework. No "In Progress" work is accepted.
- 2) Obtain a SWC student identification number.
- 3) Submit a complete dental hygiene online application with supporting documents, if applicable, prior to the deadline.
- 4) Official transcripts that confirm completion of prerequisites must be received at SWC Admissions by the application deadline.

Applications missing supporting documentation and/or transcripts deems application as incomplete.

#### **Selection Process**

Dental Hygiene Program candidates are chosen to fill 36 available positions per cohort (cohort begins in the Fall of the same year in which you apply). 10 alternate candidates will also be selected in the event a candidate (from the 36) declines acceptance.

Candidates will be selected by lottery. Each eligible candidate will be assigned a number. Numbers will be selected at random to fill available spots in program.

Applicants not accepted as candidate or alternate must re-apply the following year.

The program has no waiting list.

#### **ALTERNATES**

Candidates placed on the alternate list are not guaranteed a position in the incoming class. Alternates who are not offered a permanent position in the class are required to complete a NEW application in the next application period (January).

Applicants will be assigned a number for lottery only after verification of:

- 1. Complete application (without errors) is received by deadline with **ALL** required documentation.
- 2. Prerequisites/requirements are met and verified as such by the Dental Hygiene Program

This will be adhered to for any available position for the program, including an alternate position.

# **Selection Process (continued)**

The number of candidates accepted each year is subject to change at the discretion of the program director. This can be based on but not limited to state and local orders/mandates or student cohort obligations. The number of candidates selected to start the program may be reduced due to the COVID-19 pandemic and physical distancing requirements for our clinic setting.

### **Additional Requirements**

Once admitted to the Dental Hygiene Program, students must provide verification of the following:

- 1) Student Education Plan (SEP). Meet with an SWC counselor to develop SEP.
- 2) Current CPR Certification: must be Basic Life Support (BLS) for Healthcare Providers. Must include training with the AED. *Certification course must include hands on (in person) training.*
- 3) Physical Health Examination
- 4) Proof of Current Immunizations
  - a) COVID-19 Vaccination
  - b) Rubeola and Rubella Immunity Verification
  - c) Hepatitis B Immunity Verification
    Important: Hepatitis B vaccine is done in a three-part series approximately two months apart (for each vaccination). It is recommended that applicants visit their medical provider early to start the series if you don't already have it completed.
  - d) Varicella Immunity Verification
  - e) Tuberculosis Screening

More information on above list and related forms will be disseminated at mandatory new student orientation for accepted candidates only.

## **Notice of Occupational Hazards**

Applicants should be aware that occupational hazards for the field of dental hygiene may include and are not limited to exposure to infectious diseases such as COVID-19, AIDS or hepatitis, hazardous chemicals or substances, accidental injury, neuromuscular problems, blood borne pathogens, radiation and allergic reactions to latex, anesthetic agents, or other chemical agents.

## **Estimated Program Cost**

The cost of the two-year Dental Hygiene Program (for students who meet the California residency requirement) is currently estimated to range between \$11,000 – 12,000. The greatest direct expense occurs in the first semester. Instruments, instructional supplies, textbooks, and uniforms are the major cost items. An estimated cost of \$6000 will be needed prior to the start of classes (July 1st approximately). Living expenses and transportation costs are not included nor is the cost to complete prerequisite/general education courses for the degree. ### **Financial Aid**

Financial Aid may be available to those who qualify. The federal government and the state of California provides funds in the form of loans, grants, on-campus jobs, and scholarships. Find out more at SWC Financial Aid.

Due to the commitment of class and study time, it is recommended that students limit outside employment to no more than 20 hours per week.

# Dental Hygiene Program Course Sequence

To successfully progress through the two-year program, students are required to pass dental hygiene courses at 75% or better. Each Dental Hygiene course is offered only once during the academic year.
