This marks the 4th year in a row that we've sent our paramedic class to attend this highly specialized training which provides them up-to-date information on domestic and international terrorism, chemical and biological warfare and most importantly, provides them hands-on training actually using the equipment which they will encounter as responders throughout their career.

Southwestern College was the first paramedic training program from the western United States to send their entire class to this training, and we continue to send our students every year at no expense to the college or our students. This training is fully funded by the Department of Homeland Security and better prepares our students for their future careers as paramedics as well as their marketability when they enter the job market upon graduation.

PREPARE FOR A CAREER IN LOGISTICS AND TRANSPORTATION

Southwestern Community College Logistics and Transportation Certificate/A.S. Degree Program can prepare you for trade related careers in logistics, transportation, warehousing, inventory and distribution.
