- 3. During excavation, unsuitable soils were found at all of the building pad locations. The soils engineer determined that an addition of 8-12 feet of soil would need to be removed to achieve compaction to ensure building foundations would not fail. This cost includes fill soil needed for proper compaction.
- On two buildings 300/400 corner masonry (d) details provided by architect was not buildable.
 To achieve the proper corner angles on these buildings, additional labor and materials are required.
- 5. Remove four fire hydrants and relocate one fire hydrant authorized by the City Fire Marshal the City of San Diego.

1. INTERAGENCY AGREEMENT WITH COMMUNITY COLLEGE FOUNDATION AND LANE TECHNICIAN TRAINING PROGRAM

Authorize agreement with the Foundation For California Community Colleges, to conduct a Referee and Lane Technician Training Program, for the period from September 1, 2006 to August 31, 2007, inclusive, at \$1,000 per month rent, income to the District.

OVERVIEW

This agreement continues an established Referee and Lane Technician Training Program in affiliation with the California Community College Foundation. The California Bureau of Automotive Repair through the Foundation provides referees to hear consumer complaints and negotiate disputes and to train student technicians to perform the necessary technical services in the State's Smog Check program. The goals the partnerships between the Foundation and California Community Colleges is to train college students in critical technical services while providing the citizen, consumer and taxpayer, economical alternatives associated with vehicle ownership and a safer, healthier living environment. The purpose of this agreement is to conduct a Referee and Lane Technician Training Program that combines the public service Smog Check Referee Program with a training program for students enrolled in the Automotive Technology Program at Southwestern College.

FISCAL IMPACT/FUNDING SOURCE

The Referee and Lane Technician Training rent for the use of Southwestern College facilities to be used in the automotive program areas.

2. COLLABORATIVE WITH MEITETSU TRAVEL USA CORPORATION - PARAMEDIC

Authorize agreement with Meitetsu Travel USA Corporation, to provide educational and cultural experiences for Japanese students studying paramedic methods, for the period from December 4 to December 6, 2006, inclusive, for the amount of \$6,000, income to the District.

OVERVIEW

The Southwestern College Athletic Department will host an educational and cultural experience for Japanese students studying paramedic methods. Their experience will include observing how paramedic programs operate at community colleges. Students will also have the opportunity to learn and practice paramedic methods and procedures as taught in the United States. Additionally, they will have the opportunity to participate in college life activities and observe intercollegiate sporting events.

The experiences will include observing how athletic training programs operate at community colleges and four-year private and public institutions. Students will also have the opportunity to learn and practice athletic training methods as taught in the United States. Additionally, they will have the opportunity to participate in college life activities and observe intercollegiate sporting events.

FISCAL IMPACT/FUNDING SOURCE

No cost to the District.

4. AGREEMENT WITH R&K ENTERPRISES

Approve agreement with R&K Enterprises, to perform data analysis of the mathematics department final exams, for the period from October 12, 2006 to June 30, 2007, inclusive, for the amount of \$12,000.

OVERVIEW

Per Vice President Dyste, the Research Office presently is undergoing reorganization. Outsourcing the analysis of data through a Letter of Agreement (LOA) with R&K Enterprises provides continuity to the pilot project which began spring 2006. The analysis of student data from the department finals in mathematics is necessary in order to validate the final exam as required by new accreditation standards. In addition, the agreement will preserve student and instructor confidentiality and provide consistent analysis of student success and outcomes. It is expected that the final exam data will encompass approximately 8,000–12,000 students during the 2006–2007 school year.

FISCAL IMPACT/FUNDING SOURCE

Account No. 5123-493041-000, General Fund Unrestricted.

15-A. ACADEMIC AFFAIRS (CONTINUED)

5. SUBCONTRACT AGREEMENT WITH ARBOR E&T, LLC

Authorize agreement with Arbor E&T, LLC, for assessment services to youth, adults, and dislocated worker clients at the South County Career Center, for the period from July 1, 2006 to June 30, 2007, inclusive, for the amount of \$178,350, income to the District.

OVERVIEW

The national Workforce Investment Act (WIA) mandates community college involvement with the San Diego Workforce Investment Board (WIB) and its staff agency, the San Diego Workforce Partnership. Arbor E&T, LLC is the fiscal agent/operator for the South County Career Center (SCCC), one of six one-stop career centers in San Diego County, funded by WIA. This agreement describes the services provided by Southwestern College at the South County Career Center located on Bay Boulevard in Chula Vista, serving clients and students who live within the College district boundaries. Southwestern College has been providing similar services at the Center since 1993.

FISCAL IMPACT/FUNDING SOURCE

Account No. 8835-701703-928, General Fund Restricted.

6. MEMORANDUM OF UNDERSTANDING WITH UNITED STATES NAVY, NAVY BASE, CORONADO

Authorize the Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) with United States Navy, Navy Base, Coronado, establishing guidelines for the delivery of educational services to active duty personnel, reservists, eligible retired military personnel, Department of Defense employees, civilians and their adult family members, for the period from October 1, 2006 through October 1, 2009, inclusive, at no cost to the District.

OVERVIEW

This MOU is entered into every three years between United States Navy, Navy Base, Coronado and Southwestern Community College District, on behalf of Southwestern College. The guidelines are incorporated into the MOU by reference and outline program responsibilities, roles, and expectations for United States Navy, Navy Base, Coronado and the District. Renewal of this existing MOU which was initiated in the 1980s, outlines the delivery of the educational services by Southwestern Community College District which in the past included a general studies program.

FISCAL IMPACT/FUNDING SOURCE

No cost to the District.

15-A. ACADEMIC AFFAIRS (CONTINUED)

AGREEMENT WITH NORTH COUNTY FIRE PROTECTION DISTRICT

Authorize agreement with North County Fire Protection District, to provide opportunities for paramedic students to obtain field training experience, for the period from October 15, 2006 to December 31, 2007, inclusive, at no cost to the District.

OVERVIEW

This new agreement will establish the above-referenced agency as a site wherein the emergency medical technology and paramedic students may obtain required field training experience as mandated by state and local regulations. The College Paramedic Program provides training for approximately 85 students per year.

FISCAL IMPACT/FUNDING SOURCE

No cost to the District.

8. ESTABLISHMENT OF A MATH & SCIENCE RESEARCH AND TRAINING INSTITUTE

Authorize establishment of the Southwestern College Math & Science Research and Training Institute under the general supervision and oversight of the Dean of the School of Mathematics, Science and Engineering (MSE), to provide opportunities to faculty and students, and increase Southwestern College visibility and ties with the community, industry, academic, and research entities. The Institute will be housed in the School of Mathematics, Science and Engineering (MSE) and will operate from revenues from external sources.

OVERVIEW

Students majoring in mathematics, science and engineering have identified participation in research internship as one of the top factors contributing to their academic success. In addition, student participation in research internships and laboratory training have been lauded as mechanisms for student recruitment, retention and successful transfer to baccalaureate-granting institutions.

FISCAL IMPACT/FUNDING SOURCE

No cost to the District.

AGREEMENT WITH VETERANS' HOME OF CALIFORNIA – CHULA VISTA

Ratify agreement with Veterans' Home of California – Chula Vista, to provide opportunities for health occupation program students to obtain training experience, for the period from July 1, 2006 to June 30, 2007, inclusive, at no cost to the District.

OVERVIEW

This agreement re-establishes the above-referenced agency as a site wherein the health occupation program students obtain clinical experience.

FISCAL IMPACT/FUNDING SOURCE

No cost to the District.

15-B. ADMINISTRATIVE AFFAIRS

1. CONSTRUCTABILITY REVIEW OF 800/850 MUSIC BUILDING

Authorize agreement with Gilbane Building Company, to provide constructability, value engineering, and a construction cost estimate for the 800/850 music building construction project, for the period from October 12, 2006 to February 28, 2007, inclusive, in an amount not to exceed \$30,000.

OVERVIEW

During the 50% and 80% stages of development of the working drawings, constructability reviews are performed to evaluate the architect's drawings to identify construction coordination conflicts. During this process a value engineering review is also performed to determine if the most cost effective products and materials are included in the drawings to ensure the least cost for the project. These reviews are performed to ensure that the facility can be built in accordance with the drawings and the design has been completed within the scope and the project budget. These reviews are intended to limit the possibility of change orders during construction.

FISCAL IMPACT/FUNDING SOURCE

Proposition AA will be used to pay for the costs of this agreement. No general fund expenditures will be used for this program.

2. AGREEMENT WITH MAAS COMPANIES, LLC FOR PROGRAM MANAGEMENT OF THE PROPOSITION AA BOND PROGRAM

Authorize an extension agreement with Maas Companies, LLC, to provide program management services for Proposition AA Bond Program, for the period from October 12, 2006 to September 30, 2009, inclusive, for an amount not to exceed \$240,000 annually, billed hourly.

OVERVIEW

The Maas Companies have been providing program management of the Proposition AA Bond Program since May 2001. During this period, 115 classrooms have been renovated and technology installed, 30 buildings have had heating and ventilation units and new roofs installed. In addition, 20 restrooms have been made accessible to the disabled. Six new buildings have been constructed or renovated. These include the Higher Education Center at National City, the Child Development Center, the Student Services Center, and the Academic Success Center at the Chula Vista campus. The consultants are assisting staff with several projects that are under construction or in the planning phase. These projects include the Southwestern College Higher Education Center at Otay Mesa, 800 & 850 Music Buildings, the reconstruction of the Southwestern College Education Center at San Ysidro and the Perimeter Road Fire Line Safety project. All Proposition AA projects are anticipated to be completed by the end of 2009. The services of the consultant are intended to augment District staff and they will serve as the District representatives on certain projects. The services are billed hourly as needed and are funded 100% through the proposition AA Bond measure.

FISCAL IMPACT/FUNDING SOURCE

Proposition AA Bond funds will be used to pay the costs of this agreement. No general fund expenditures will be used for this project.

15-B. ADMINISTRATIVE AFFAIRS (CONTINUED)

3. SATELLITE NEWS, ENTERTAINMENT, AND EDUCATION

Authorize agreement with MTVU Networks On Campus, Inc., to install five (5) forty-two inch plasma televisions, three (3) twenty-five inch regular televisions, and free cable programming services, for the period from October 12, 2006 through September 30, 2009, inclusive, at no cost to the District.

OVERVIEW

MTVU is an on-air, on-line campus network created for college campuses. This network broadcasts to over 700 campuses nation-wide featuring original short format programming and is updated daily. National issues are broadcast through the day and breaking news as it happens. The network will not advertise tobacco products, alcoholic beverages, prescription drugs, 900 numbers, or religious/political advertisements. The service will be provided in the Student Union dining area and the Fitness Center at the Chula Vista campus.

FISCAL IMPACT/FUNDING SOURCE

No cost to the District.

4. ASBESTOS AND LEAD-BASED PAINT SURVEY

Approve agreement with Allstate Services Environmental, Inc. (ASEI), to conduct an asbestos and lead-based paint inspection for the 800 and 850 Buildings remodeling project, for the period from October 12, 2006 to January 31, 2007, inclusive, for an amount not to exceed \$7,423.

OVERVIEW

The District is required to perform an asbestos and lead-paint inspection by the Division of State Architect (DSA) and the uniform building code. Upon completion, the survey information will be included in the construction specifications to ensure any unsuitable materials are removed in accordance with state environmental standards.

FISCAL IMPACT/FUNDING SOURCE

Proposition AA will be used to pay for the costs of this agreement. No general fund expenditures will be used for this program.

15-B. ADMINISTRATIVE AFFAIRS (CONTINUED)

CONSULTANT AGREEMENT FOR PREPARATION AND COMPLETION OF EDUCATIONAL MASTER PLAN

Authorize the Interim Superintendent/President to enter into an agreement with a consulting firm for the preparation of the Southwestern Community College District Educational and Facilities Master Plans during the period from October 12, 2006 to July 31, 2007, inclusive, at a cost not to exceed \$340,000.

OVERVIEW

The District is required to have a current Educational and Facilities Master Plan in accordance with Title 5, State Administrative Code, State of California. The last plan was completed in year 2000 and should be updated every five years. This review will include all instructional and non-instructional programs and all District facilities. Upon the completion of the program review a facilities plan will be developed to support program needs. Status reports will be provided to the Board as progress proceeds. Upon acceptance by the Board of Trustees of the complete plan, the information will be used to request state funding for construction and the foundation for a potential local bond issue.

FISCAL IMPACT/FUNDING SOURCE

General Fund

15-C. HUMAN RESOURCES

AGREEMENT WITH THE BODINE GROUP FOR CONSULTING SERVICES

Approve agreement with The Bodine Group, for consulting services, for the period from October 12, 2006 to February 28, 2007, inclusive, for the amount of \$1,000 per day, plus expenses (includes airfare, mileage, lodging and meals), total not to exceed \$15,000.

OVERVIEW

This agreement provides for training and consulting services in interest-based bargaining facilitated by The Bodine Group. Previously, (December 2005), The Bodine Group facilitated SCEA/District labor negotiations utilizing the principles of interest-based bargaining. Subsequently, the District and SCEA reached a tentative agreement that was presented as a joint proposal to the Governing Board on April 19, 2006. Expenditures incurred in this workshop will be submitted for reimbursement pursuant to SB 160 Cost Mandate regulations estimated at \$135, per hour reimbursement rate; total expenditure \$7,800.

FISCAL IMPACT/FUNDING SOURCE

A. RESOLUTION ESTABLISHING GANN APPROPRIATION LIMIT (Fitzsimons)

Adopt resolution establishing the Gann Appropriation Limit for FY 2006-2007.

OVERVIEW

Pursuant to Article XIII-B of the California Constitution and Chapter 1205. Statues of 1979, all community college districts are required to compute an annual appropriation limit. That appropriation limit is adjusted annually for changes in price index, population, and other applicable factors.

Government Code Section 7908(c) requires each community college district to report to the Chancellor's Office. California Community Colleges at least annually its appropriation limit, appropriations subject to limit, the amount of State aid appropriations, and subventions included within the proceeds of taxes of the district, and amounts excluded from the appropriations subject to limit.

FISCAL IMPACT/FUNDING SOURCE

This calculation determines the FY 2006-2007 appropriation limit per Article XIII-B. California Constitution is \$99,155,645.

B. AMENDMENT OF RESOLUTION NO. 1517- AUTHORIZATION TO IMPLEMENT REQUIREMENTS OF EDUCATION CODE SECTION 88051 IN RESPONSE TO MERIT SYSTEM PETITION

(Yokotobi)

Amend Resolution No. 1517, adopted by the Governing Board on September 13, 2006.

OVERVIEW

On September 13, 2006, the Governing Board adopted a resolution regarding the implementation requirements of the merit system petition. The resolution has been amended to reflect a change in the date of the merit system. The resolution indicates an election date of October 3, 2006; the election will now be held on October 10, 2006. Changes are shown by strike-through of language being deleted and new language is underlined.

C. RESOLUTION CERTIFYING MERIT SYSTEM ELECTION RESULTS (Yokotobi)

Adopt resolution certifying the Merit System election results and directing staff to take appropriate next steps.

OVERVIEW

As required, on October 10, 2006, an election will be held for all eligible classified employees of the Southwestern Community College District to vote for or against the implementation of a Merit System. Pursuant to Resolution No. 1517 adopted by the Governing Board on September 13, 2006, the results of the election shall be certified by the Governing Board at the October 11, 2006 regular Governing Board meeting.

D. RESOLUTION IN SUPPORT OF PROPOSITION 1D - THE KINDERGARTEN-UNIVERSITY PUBLIC EDUCATION FACILITIES BOND ACT OF 2006

Adopt resolution in support of Proposition 1D – The Kindergarten-University Public Education Facilities Bond Act of 2006.

OVERVIEW

Proposition 1D will be on the November 2006, statewide general election ballot, and will have a direct impact on the Southwestern Community College District. The proposition would provide \$3.1 billion for public higher education facilities, including \$1.5 billion over the next two years for the California Community Colleges, for building projects to serve the educational needs of the system's 1.6 million students.

The District has three projects already approved for funding from the proceeds of Proposition 1D should it succeed. At a minimum, Proposition 1D would provide \$11.3 million in state funding to the District for 3 capital projects: \$5.3 million for modernization of music instruction facilities, \$3.2 million for the Perimeter/Life Safety Road Project, and \$2.8 million for modernization of the Photography Instructional and Laboratory Building Project. In addition to Proposition 1D funds, the estimated District contribution to the projects from Proposition AA Bond funds is approximately \$5.6 million.

The District Legislative Program supports state bond measures for community college facilities.

FISCAL IMPACT/FUNDING SOURCE

Approximately \$11.3 million funding from Proposition 1D to the District for three capital projects.
