OVERVIEW

The Positive Attendance Tracking (PAT) system was developed for Southwestern College by Provost Systems to track individual tutoring sessions using computers and kiosks. PAT tutoring service data is submitted to the state for non-credit FTES revenue. Provost Systems will modify the system so that it will automatically delete a previous session if a student logs into the system from a different location. Making this change will ensure the system records only one tutoring session at a time and keeps the college in compliance with state guidelines regarding collection of non-credit FTES revenue.
