IGETC is a general education pattern that will meet all lower-division general education requirements at most California State University (CSU) or University of California (UC) campuses. Completion of the IGETC is not a requirement for admission to the CSU or UC, nor will its completion guarantee admission to a CSU or UC campus. The IGETC pattern is not the only way to fulfill lower-division general education requirements. Depending on the major or field of interest, it may be advantageous to fulfill the general education breadth of the specific CSU or UC campus.

Please consult with a counselor to determine whether IGETC is appropriate for your educational goals.

Some rules for using IGETC:

1. Each course must have been IGETC approved at the time it was taken. See www.assist.org for a list of certified courses and approval dates.
2. All courses must be passed with a "C" or higher. A "P" (Pass) is acceptable, but UC permits no more than 14 transferable semester units to be completed on a pass/no pass basis.
3. Some community college courses have limitations on the amount of credit awarded by the receiving university. See a counselor for details.

Area 6 LANGUAGES OTHER THAN ENGLISH (UC Requirement Only)	
<input type="checkbox"/> 1. Completion of two years of high school study in the same language with a grade of "C" or better.	
<input type="checkbox"/> 2. Satisfactory completion, with C grades or better, of two years of formal schooling at the sixth grade level or higher in an institution where the language of instruction is not English. The appropriate documentation such as a letter from the ministry of education must be presented to the evaluation office to substantiate that the required coursework was completed. High school transcripts are not acceptable unless they clearly state that the two years of instruction were done in the student's native language other than English. Students who cannot provide such documentation should either pass one of the examinations or tests listed below in 3 through 5, or satisfactorily complete an appropriate language course at Southwestern College, as outlined in 6 below.	
<input type="checkbox"/> 3. Satisfactory score, 500 or higher, in the SAT II: Subject Tests in languages other than English. Consult the College Board for exact scores over 500 after May 1995 and requirements before May 1995.

<input type="checkbox"/> 5. Satisfactory score, 5 or higher, in the International Baccalaureate Higher Level Examinations in language other than English.

California State University (CSU) Graduation Requirement: Courses in U. S. History, Constitution and American Ideals are required for graduation by the CSU. Although the U. S. History, Constitution and American Ideals requirement is not part of the IGETC pattern, students who plan to transfer to the CSU are encouraged to complete the requirement prior to transfer to satisfy CSU graduation requirements. This requirement can be satisfied by completing any combination of two classes that, when combined, fulfill US-1, US-2 and US-3.
