- MATH 100* Mathematics for General Education **with** MATH 82* (NC 282**) **OR**
- MATH 119* Elementary Statistics **with** MATH 84* (NC 284**) Statistics for the Behavioral Sciences
- **OR**
- PSYC 270/ SOC 270 Statistics for the Behavioral Sciences

SLAM 3 Placement Level Recommendation

Take only one of the following:

- MATH 100 Mathematics for General Education
- **OR**
- MATH 119 Elementary Statistics
- **OR**
- PSYC 270/ SOC 270 Statistics for the Behavioral Sciences

* MATH 81-87 are support courses. Look for paired sections with an S in the schedule, e.g. MATH 110-S01 and MATH 82-S01.

** Noncredit (NC) MATH co-requisite support courses are equivalent to credit co-requisite support courses. The benefits of the courses include no tuition and not appearing on your credit transcript.
