- Received an update on Prop R and Z expenditures and progress of projects.

Instructional Complex 1

The district broke ground on Nov. 9, 2022 for this academic building that will dramatically change the front of the Chula Vista campus and change the educational opportunities available to students. At more than 80,000 square feet, it will house a range of teaching and learning spaces and lecture classrooms. A new state-of-the-art planetarium will be part of the new instructional complex

and the building will share its space with a University Center. Here, four-year universities can offer bachelor's degree programs for South County residents.

Student Union Complex

Students and Johnny Jaguar took center stage at the Feb. 27, 2023 groundbreaking for the new Student Union. It will house a new cafeteria, bookstore and office spaces for the Veterans' Resource Center, Learning Communities, the SWC Cares Hub (Jag Kitchen Food Pantry and Cares Closet). Also included is space for Personal Wellness, the Culinary Arts program, meeting spaces for the ASO and a ballroom.

Project Budget: \$101 million Project Status: Under construction Projected Completion: October, 2024







Jaguar Village

These structures provide temporary office space for student activities and student resources displaced while new buildings are constructed. Near the Math and Science building, the Jaguar Village houses Associated Student Organization offices, Health Services, Veterans Resource Center and the Learning Communities Hub.

> Project Budget: \$3 million Project Status: Complete

Operations and Warehouse Relocation

Phases 1 and 2 have consolidated Facilities Operations, Maintenance and Grounds into one location at the far west portion of campus near the Child Development Center. Phases 3 and 4, which includes construction of buildings for operations and the warehouse will be bid after Baseball, Softball and trellis projects are bid. If there is insufficient funding, the projects will be postponed for a future bond measure.

Project Budget: \$48.6 million, subject to remaining available funding

Landscape & Nursery Technology

Classrooms and support space are under construction to house the LNT program in the South Bay Botanic Garden after the scope of the project was reduced to fit within budget. Project reductions included reducing the size of the multipurpose room and reducing some of the landscape improvements. Students will learn about design, construction, maintenance, nursery production and all landscape-related professions. Support facilities include a greenhouse.

Project Budget: \$38.6 million Project Status: Under construction Projected Completion: March, 2024

Baseball & Softball Facilities Upgrades

A new, expanded baseball press box will allow home and visiting coaches to view play and include areas for the press and announcer. A much-needed restroom building will be constructed at the softball field. Both site areas will have fully accessible paths from parking areas. A new firemain will be looped in close proximity to each site so new fire hydrants can be installed at each area. Additionally, a new sewer and water line will be provided to the baseball site for potential future expansion.

Project Budget: \$1.9 million Project Status: Bidding scheduled Feb. 2023, construction scheduled to begin in summer 2023 Projected Completion: November,

Tennis Court Relocation

A greatly expanded tennis center with a centralized championship court with spectator seating and access to a new clubhouse will be constructed in Parking Lot G (by the Child Development Center). The center will also include 10 new, state-of-the-art tennis courts, a clubhouse with a team room, accessible restrooms, sports medicine spaces, coach's office and functionality to service after-school student programs. The project includes upgraded lighting to allow community use in the evening.

Project Budget: \$8 million

Project Status: Bidding scheduled for Jan. 2023, construction scheduled to begin in summer 2023

Projected Completion: December, 2023

Automotive Technology Relocation

Phase 1 includes all design and permitting for moving the program from the Chula Vista campus to the Otay Mesa campus. The new 59,000 square foot, one-story Automotive Technology Center will contain offices, classrooms, high-bay labs, student project spaces, workshops for welding and areas to store project cars. Current funding purchased modern automotive equipment that students are now using in their current facility. Phase 2 will begin when additional bond funding is available.

Project Budget: \$2.5 million Project Status: Phase 1 complete

Major upgrades to utilities, sewer lines and paths of travel for ADA compliance are occurring throughout the Chula Vista campus. Funding includes upgrades to fire alarms.

Annual Performance and Financial Audits

The independent auditing firm of Eide Bailly, LLC conducted the district's annual audit. The auditor's opinion notes that the district's financial statements, including Propositions R and Z, properly present the financial position and remaining fund information as of June 30, 2022. In a report provided to the Governing Board, the auditors provided assurances that the district properly complies with Generally Accepted Accounting Principles (GAAP) and Federal and State regulations.

About Propositions R and Z

Proposition R is the \$389 million general obligation bond approved by voters in 2008. Proposition Z is the \$400 million general obligation bond approved by voters in 2016. A total of \$482.2 million from both bond measures has been spent. Proceeds have constructed new facilities that have greatly enhanced the educational and community experiences available to the residents of South County. Academic buildings have been constructed at the Chula Vista, National City and Otay Mesa campuses. New community buildings, such as the Performing Arts Center and the Wellness and Aquatics Complex, offer all residents an opportunity to connect with the college. There are sufficient bond funds to complete projects within this document, with the exception of two projects outlined.
